#### **Issues - Program List (April 10, 2007)**

As required quarterly by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), this Issues and Program List will identify the programs aired over <u>WETD 90.7 FM</u>, <u>State University of New York</u>, <u>Alfred, NY 14802</u> over the preceding quarter (January 10, 2007 – April 9, 2007). In order to fulfill part <u>73.3527</u> of Title 47 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) regarding non-commercial, educational radio stations, WETD 90.7 FM is required by the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) to submit a Quarterly List reflecting the "*licensee's most significant programming treatment of community issues*". The Issues – Program List must be filed in the Public Inspection File each quarter (On January 10<sup>th</sup>, April 10<sup>th</sup>, July 10<sup>th</sup>, and October 10<sup>th</sup>.)

WETD 90.7 FM is owned by The State University of New York (SUNY). Interim President, Dr. John Clark, and the President's Counsel of Alfred State College (ASC) oversee the daily operation of the radio station. WETD is funded and operated as an ASC Student Senate-funded club.

WETD continues to seek to determine definitely what issues are affecting our community, and provide serious treatment for our listeners within the FCC defined guidelines for Issues and Programming Lists. The BOD has worked towards this by conducting the Community-wide survey concerning what are the most significant issues that affect our listener's lives. There are several clear areas, most notably personal finance and personal relationships. WETD is looking at all identified areas in this survey for adding need-specific programming for our listeners.

The main programs on the Issues & Programming list are **The Health Show**, 51%, and **The Best of our Knowledge**.

- 1. **The Health Show** is a nationally syndicated public radio program produced by the National Productions unit at Northeast Public Radio. The program covers all aspects of modern health: prevention, treatment, research, administration and more. Each week *The Health Show* breaks the issues down so you can be a better informed patient or care-provider.
